Philosophy of Student Ministry

World history reveals that Christianity has gone through periods of growth and decline. It is safe to say that the global West, especially the United States, is experiencing a decline of Christianity. It has become normal to hear of kids who grew up in church, were baptized, and did the "Christian" thing just to leave once they become adults. So, what is going on? Certainly, some students leave because they were never truly a part of what was happening (1 Jn. 2:19), but others leave for legitimate reasons. So how should we respond as believers? We ought to pray knowing God is the one who saves (Jonah 2:9), and act trusting God will use our efforts for his purpose of redemption.

Acknowledging that students are primarily to be discipled by their parents (Prov. 1:8-9; 13:24; 22:6, Eph. 6:4), student ministry can come alongside parents to provide opportunities to disciple students for Christ. My personal philosophy for student ministry is for students to experience and develop three things: biblical community, biblical literacy, and critical thinking skills. It is helpful to think of these as belonging to God's Community, knowing Christ through the Scriptures, and going on mission for Christ.

1. Biblical Community (Belong)

Humans are designed to find identity, purpose, and belonging within community. This means that it is essential for a student ministry to be a place where each student feels known, loved, valued, and needed. This healthy environment allows students to develop strong relationships with peers and adults. Strong relationships then unlock the door to authentic and fruitful Bible study, prayer, confession of sin, fellowship, and fun.

2. Biblical Literacy (Know)

We live in a time where people have little to no understanding of what the Bible actually says. Instead of relying on the opinions of others and secondhand information, student ministry should equip students to read and comprehend the Bible for themselves. Not only does this enable students to interact with what God has revealed in the Scriptures for a lifetime, but it protects them from misinformation about God or the Bible.

3. Critical Thinking Skills (Go)

Regardless of the subject, it is unwise to believe everything you hear. Rather than creating students who can regurgitate the "right" convictions that they may or may not hold, student ministry ought to teach students how to think through what they believe. If we believe the Bible to be inerrant and infallible, which we do, we ought to create an environment that invites open and honest conversation about what the Bible says. Difficult spiritual conversations not only reveal that Christianity is the most coherent and existentially satisfying worldview, but they exemplify how to have loving and charitable conversations with those who disagree (Ps. 127:5).
